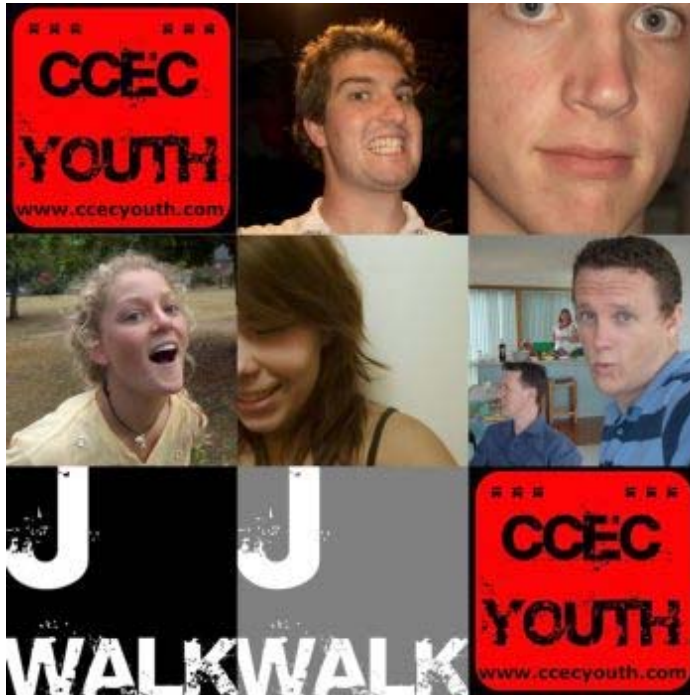

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TIPS TO PARENTS

How can Christian parents help their children transition well through the teenage years? Here is what I said to parents of 6 graders as they prepare to enter youth group in 2008.

Knowing your parenting role is a great start. Christian parents are in the business of helping their children transfer authorities. That is moving themselves out of the authoritative position where a child always refers to them with regard to what they should do, act and say. To moving the Word of God into that position. For an adult Christians response to the question of 'what should I do here' starts with 'what does the Bible say'.

Here are some ways that Christian parents can help their children in this process.

Modelling

As is true for life in general most things are more 'caught than taught'. This is especially true in family life. Sure your words matter but chil-

dren particularly watch what you do and will model themselves on that. The apostle Paul knew the power of modelling as he reminded Timothy his spiritual son 'you know... my way of life, my purpose, faith, patience, love, endurance' so he urged him 'continue in what you have learned and become convinced of'. (2 Tim 3:10,14) Our children will follow our example and giving them a good example is a wonderful and powerful heritage. I find this a real challenge as a parent!

Membership

We are all members of numerous communities in society; schools, sporting groups, work groups etc. But the church is not 'any' community group. We are Christ's body, his people, the sheep that He shepherds. Passing on this understanding and value of Christ's body is critical for our children. We want them to have a special place in their heart for God's people. If you attend church

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regularly and give of yourself to the people there you will go a long way towards them grasping this. This understanding will help them stick at church and youth group through the tough times. Friendship's forged over many years of fellowship around God's word have no equal!

Monotony

Ok so monotony fits with the 'M's but it doesn't sound good! Let me explain. In a world that wants and 'ah hah' moment all the time and 'bigger, faster, quicker' we face the danger of creating unhelpful and unrealistic expectations in our youth. I want them to value the 'drip, drip, drip' of life. Much of the mature Christian life is 'drip, drip, drip' ...family devotions, daily times of prayer and bible reading, week in and week out bible studies and sermons....you might only get the 'ah hah' moment occasionally. BUT the drip, drip, drip is creating worldviews and forming character that is quality right to the core! You don't get stalagmites and stalactites overnight. Don't miss hear me....we love 'fun' at ccecyouth but in the end we want our children to follow Jesus all their life and that requires Godly habits that may appear 'monotonous' to the untrained eye.

Finally, seek to foster, grow and strengthen your Christian friends, your church life friends. The reality is that it is statistically unlikely you will remain close friends with your school friends much further beyond school, your church friends, those around you at youth group, will be the ones to stand the test of time.

I like my school friends who I see every now and then. But I love my Christian friends who have stuck with me, grown in Christ with me and have been used by God to strengthen my own relationship with him.

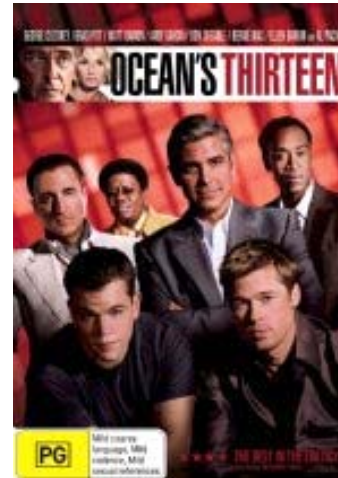

Artist: *The Almost*
Album: *Southern Weather*
Year: 2007



One of the main draws to this album is obviously going to be Aaron Gillespie's amazing drum work. While most know him from his work with *Underoath* those that are not attracted to the heavier sound of *Underoath* might be surprised with the diversity of this artist. The Almost have created a sound more attuned to a mainstream audience, yet rest assured this new sound doesn't mean a drop in quality. *Southern Weather* is a well-rounded album full of quality songs each ringing with its own distinctive hook. The album is relatively open with ideas and themes presented particularly in relation to song such as *Amazing Because It Is*, which crescendos toward the end with a chorus of voices singing the words from the well-known *Amazing Grace*. The ideas are simple with lines like "I'm lost without you, I need you, I need you" Gillespie sings with amazing passion and conviction that it's hard not to reflect on the words and how we should respond to the sacrifice of Jesus and the undeserved gift of grace we can now enjoy. When Passing Isn't Good Enough

Caution: There are only two people who MUST listen to my advice on this, and neither of them has started Kindergarten. So, if your parents disagree with me, you need to listen to them. Also, my husband teaches at GPCC, so I probably need to say that whilst he and I agree on most, if not everything, of what I'm about to say, it's in no way the official position of GPCC or anything like that!

a. School sux..?

There aren't many people who claim to love school. I think far more people enjoy school than would ever admit it, but I'll hazard a guess that a great number of you don't wake up early on Monday morning excited at the thought of the start of the school week. However, waking up to go to school on a Monday morning is something far too many kids around the world don't have an opportunity to experience. According UNESCO (United

Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation):

Today the international community is faced with increasingly serious problems: proliferating acts of violence and conflicts; poverty and illiteracy; the gap between rich and poor; and marginalization and social exclusion in a world where one quarter of all human beings live in poverty. The right to education is an invaluable tool in the bid to eradicate poverty and to tackle these problems. How great the challenge is can be seen from the fact that some 113 million children, 60% of them girls, have no access to primary education; at least 880 million adults, including a majority of women, are illiterate. (1)

In Australia, going to school is compulsory, whether in the public or private systems, or through home-schooling. Maybe it's because we must go to school, that we take for granted the great education

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we can receive in this country. Despite Article 26 of the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights* stating that "everyone has the right to education" (2), the fact of the matter is that an unacceptably large percentage of the world's population will never even receive a primary education.

b. God's Word in a Book- you need to be able to read

God has chosen to speak to us through His Word, The Bible. It is through His Word that we can know Him, and know His plans for Creation. On the most basic and obvious level, learning to read is important, because we need to be able to understand God's Word.

As Paul says to Timothy, "But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it and how from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be competent, equipped for every good work" (2 Tim 3:14-17).

Being able to understand God's Word is so important for Christians. We need to develop good reading and language skills so we can wrestle with understanding

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what we read in the Bible; so we can know God, and so we can be equipped for every good work.

c. God's not a fan of laziness

I'd guess that majority of you are pretty confident that you can read. If you've got this far through this article, chances are, you can read! So, is that it? You can pretty much give up at school. You've learnt to read; now you can slack off? Hmm...

Schooling is compulsory in Australia. Unless you're home-schooled, you have to be in school usually until the age of fifteen. So really, you could just turn up everyday, waste your time, your friends' time, and your teachers' time. Unfortunately, that's pretty much what a lot of young people do. They're not interested in being at school, and they're just biding their time until either their parents or the government concede that they're old enough to stop turning up.

If you're a Christian, this attitude simply isn't good enough. We are exhorted to work diligently, to eschew laziness: "Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men", Col. 3:23 (ESV). You have to be at school. Work hard whilst you're there. Work hard at school, not just to please your parents (3) and teachers, but remembering that you do everything, even the mundane, in service of our Lord.

Also, some of you will be the

kind of students who can cruise by, getting top marks with little to no effort. If this is you, laziness is still not ok. Work hard. Challenge yourself; apply yourself to your work. Work heartily, as for the Lord.

d. Education costs money

Just as an aside, there is another reason you need to consider when thinking about why you should work hard at school. School isn't free. Obviously, if you go to a private school you know this, but even public education isn't really free. You might not pay school fees (though you still have to pay for books, uniforms, excursions etc.), but the cost of education is funded by people, including your parents, paying tax. Other peoples' money is going towards educating you. I'm still trying to get my head around this completely, but I'm starting to think that if other people (your parents, tax-payers...) pay for your education; it's almost like you're stealing from them if you're just going to waste your time at school.

e. P = Degree? (For those going to Uni next year).

Your years at university can be loads of fun, and are often the period in which Christians tend to do a lot of maturing. Most uni campuses have a group of Christians that meet regularly, go away on conferences together, and are seeking to sharpen and encourage each other to serve Christ. Personally, I know I grew a lot going along to NCS, OCS, NTE and MYE (Lots of acronyms involved in being a uni student!). There's usually a lot going on at most

uni campuses, and, couple this with the fact that many classes and lectures don't have a roll call, and there's a great temptation to skip a lecture or a tutorial here and there, or to do a half-hearted job on an assignment. I'm guilty of that myself. There are a couple of reasons this attitude isn't ok.

Firstly, FEE-HELP (HECS) is exactly that ... help. The actual cost of uni is staggering, but we have a system in Australia where we subsidise uni courses. Full fee paying students pay in the order of \$10000- \$55000 (4)each year for their education, but FEE-HELP usually means you generally pay \$400-\$800 per subject. If you take a Commonwealth Supported Place (most uni students), then you only pay a 'contribution' towards the cost of your course, the tax-payer picks up the rest. So basically, other peoples' hard earned wages are taxed so you can go to uni. Work hard

Secondly, you're at uni to gain a degree that will enable you to work in a particular field. I don't want to be treated by a Doctor who waggged their Anatomy classes, I don't want an accountant who skipped their lectures on taxation to help me do my tax return, and I'd be appalled if my children were being taught by a teacher who decided not to go to their tutorials on teaching reading. You know, you can probably still pass if you miss a few classes, but you're doing yourself and the people you'll be working for (or with) a great disservice.

Thirdly, are you going to be getting Youth Allowance? Youth Allowance is paid to full time students so they can concentrate on studying, rather than trying to earn enough money to pay for food and rent. If the government (read: tax-payer) is paying you so you can go to uni, you probably should go to uni.

f. The Big Picture

Work hard at school, and university, make the most of the opportunities we have in this country to get a fantastic education, but keep in mind the bigger picture. School and Uni are not the be-all and end-all. There is so much more to life. Serving the Lord Jesus and proclaiming His Kingship matter more than anything. Don't lose sight of that. Apply yourself diligently, as for the Lord. But don't get so caught up in studying that you forget to study God's Word. Don't get so caught up in getting great marks that you forget to tell your friends about Jesus. Work hard at school as a way of serving God, but don't let striving for a brilliant UAI become an idol.

Hebrews 12:1-2 (ESV)
Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the

cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

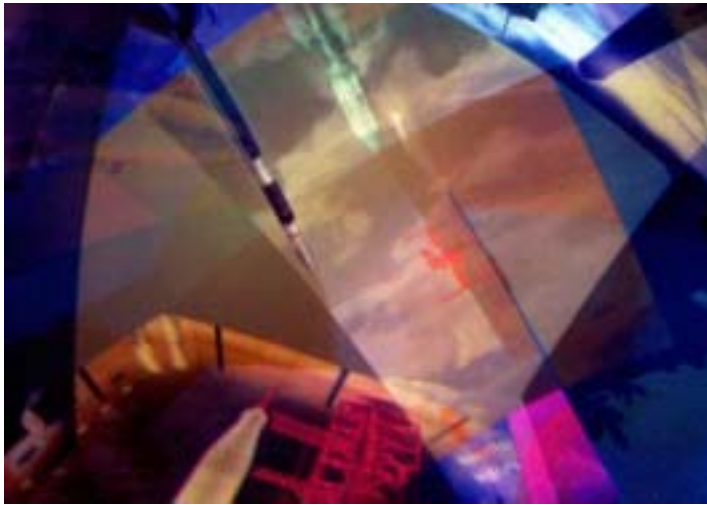
